Winter Wildlife in Simon's Town







In Simon's Town, winter (June-August) is a prime time for whale watching, particularly for Southern Right and Humpback whales. The African penguins at Boulders Beach are also active, and the fynbos biome comes alive with the winter rains, attracting Cape Sugarbirds and Sunbirds. Cape Point, a UNESCO is a wonderful nature reserve, which is on our doorstep.

SURVELLIANCE CAMERA INITIATIVE



We will be increasing our camera surveillance around Simon's Kloof boundary perimeter. This roll out and installation will take place over the next three years and will be completed in 3 Phases.

We will be increasing the numbers as follows:

ACTIVE SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS:

- now 28
- future 56 LOCATIONS:
- now 14
- future 32

This installation will totally encompass Simon's Kloof's four boundaries.

Phase 1: Northern Boundary - Runciman Drive

all identified residents have agreed to accommodate the new equipment for which we are sincerely grateful. We are aiming to commence installation by end of August 2025, with completion expected within 2-3 months (weather dependant)

Phase 2: Southern Boundary - SANParks

to commence July 26

Phase 3: Eastern & Western Boundaries - SA Navy & St Barts



STOP FIRES BEFORE THEY START



The Simons Kloof Fire Sub-Committee meets monthly and is made up of dedicated residents committed to fire safety. The committee comprises of Gavin Chamberlain, Andrew Robertson, Andries Schaap, Martin Smolders, and Sergio Capellino. Armed with the comprehensive Vulcan Fire Report, the committee has made significant strides in improving our community's fire readiness. Several initiatives have been rolled out within the Simon's Kloof area and its borders to mitigate fire risks and ensure a safer environment for all. Through the establishment of valuable relationships with key stakeholders, the Fire Sub-Committee has implemented the following initiatives:

FIRE BREAK CLEARING: We have worked alongside relevant stakeholders to clear the fire break along Simons Kloof's border with the South African Navy and alien vegetation clearing at St.Barts. **INSIGHT INTO FIRE MAINTENANCE SCHEDULES:** Our collaborations have provided insight into the fire break clearing schedules and processes for SANParks and the City of Cape Town (CoCT), which will ensure that future efforts are well-coordinated and timely.

FIRE EQUIPMENT: We have acquired two dividing breeches, which allow for the attachment of two fire hoses at once. These breeches are securely housed at 13 Horatio Way and 8 Victory Way. Reflective bibs have been procured for committee members, ensuring visibility during emergency operations

FIRE BREAK AUDIT & INTERACTIVE MAP: The completion of a thorough fire break audit has been a key milestone in our preparedness efforts. This audit has resulted in the creation of a detailed interactive map, which highlights:

- Non-compliant areas
- Vegetation that poses potential fire threats.
- Other risks requiring attention.

The interactive map is a crucial tool for ongoing discussions with stakeholders and Simon's Kloof Property Owners, ensuring that we are proactive in our fire management strategies. The map will be presented to residents as part of our Fire Preparedness Presentation, which will take place later this year. Dates and times for this session will be communicated soon

LOOKING AHEAD THE FIRE SUB COMMITTEE WILL BE FOCUSED ON:

- **ENSURING COMPLIANCE AND MAINTENANCE OF FIRE BREAKS:** Continue working with our stakeholders to ensure fire breaks are compliant and regularly maintained. This process will be part of the last-quarter clearing cycle for 2025, with a focus on addressing ongoing issues
- ENSURING OUR HYDRANTS & HOSES ARE IN WORKING ORDER: Ensuring that the fire safety equipment is always ready for use by conducting regular checks and maintenance
- **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:** We aim to keep all Simons Kloof property owners informed and involved, emphasising that fire safety is a shared responsibility. We'll be reaching out with more information on how each of us can play a part in protecting our community.

Simon's Town Museum is housed in "The Residency" which was built in 1777 as the winter residence for the Dutch East India Company Governor at the Cape. Simon's Town Museum was established in 1977 by the Simon's Town Historical Society. The Museum was originally housed in the old Simon's Town Municipality complex, but moved to "The Residency" in 1982. The building has a long history, having been used as a hospital, post office, school, customs house, police station, gaol and magistrate's court. The Museum collects and exhibits the cultural history of the people of Simon's Town and their connections with the Dutch East India Company and the Royal Navy. Visitors can explore displays featuring maritime artifacts, ship models, and historical photographs, as well as learn about Simon's Town's significant role during the colonial era and its strategic importance during the World Wars. The museum provides an engaging and educational experience for anyone interested in South Africa's coastal history.
